Ezra

Jewish tradition attributes the book to Ezra though the author does not identify himself. It was written to Israelites in Jerusalem after they returned from exile. The book's events occurred between 537-458 BC, and Ezra was written in 425BC. Ezra begins in Babylon and concludes in the ruins of post-exilic Jerusalem. – Bible Notes

Chapter 1: The Decree of Cyrus Who was Cyrus in the Bible? | GotQuestions.org

Vs. 1-4- Cyrus, king of Persia, was powerfully used by God and he knew it. What does he say and do for the Jewish exiles?

(Bible Notes- Cyrus, also know as Cyrus II or Cyrus the Great, became king of Persia around 559 B.C. After defeating the city of Babylon, where many deported Jews lived, he encouraged the Jewish exiles to return to their homeland. This event was prophesied over 200 years before by Isaiah and later by Jeremiah (Is 44:28-45:6; Jr 25:11-12; 29:10).

What were other men in that region charged to do?

Vs. 5 – Who were among the first to go back?

Vs. 6- Who supported them and why?

(Bible Notes- The journey back to Jerusalem could have taken up to four months since Jerusalem was approximately 900 miles away. Scripture does not criticize the exiles who did not wish to return. A few years later God used exiles like Mordecai and Esther, who remained in Babylon or Persia, to make His name known (see the book of Esther).

Vs. 7-11- King Cyrus felt it necessary to return all of the articles that had been taken from Jerusalem and return them for the temple. Where had Nebuchadnezzar placed these items?

How many articles did they count to be returned?

Chapter 2: The Exiles Who Returned

Vs. 1- Where are these people returning to and why?

(Bible Notes- This list is almost identical to the one found in Neh 7:6-72).

Vs. 2- (Bible Notes- Nehemiah is not the man for whom the book of the Bible is named because that Nehemiah did not return with the first group of exiles. Also, Mordecai is not the same Mordecai mentioned in the book of Esther.)

Vs. 3-60- By what groups did they record those returning?

(Bible Notes- Serving as a temple priest was a hereditary duty for the descendants of Aaron. Had this group not returned, there would be no reason to rebuild the temple since there would be no one qualified to minister on behalf of the people. Zerubbabel forbade any priest who could not prove his ancestry from serving in the temple until he could be tested by the Urim and Thummim, objects kept by the high priest in his breastplate for consulting God's will in different matters (v 63; cp. Ex 28:15).

Vs. 65- How many male and female slaves and singers were there but not included in that total?

(Bible Notes- A little over 13 months after the exiles returned to Jerusalem the temple began to be rebuilt; gathering materials took time before the work could be started.)

Vs. 10-11- Once the foundation was finally laid, what was the reaction of the priests and people of Israel?

Vs. 12- What was the reaction of the older priests, Levites, and family leaders who had seen the original temple?

Chapter 4: Opposition to Rebuilding the Temple

Vs. 1- Who heard about the rebuilding of the temple?

Vs. 2- What did they offer?

Vs. 4-5- What did these people of the land do to the people of Judah that had returned?

(Bible Notes- Vs. 6-23- This section interrupts the chronological sequence of the text, possibly to illustrate the opposition that Israel faced in trying to rebuild not only the temple but also the city.)

Vs. 6- What king reigned after Cyrus?

(Bible Notes- King Ahasuerus ruled Persia from 486 to 465 B.C. This king was also known as Xerxes, the king mentioned in the book of Esther.) Who was Xerxes in the Bible? | GotQuestions.org

The people who had moved into the land during the exile compiled a letter to this new king. What was their intention?

Vs. 7-10- Another letter was written during the reign of King Artaxerxes of Persia. Who wrote it?

Vs. 11-16- What was their message to the king?

Vs. 17-22- What was the king's reply?

Vs. 23- What did these people do upon reading the king's letter?

(Bible Notes- Later in a letter to King Artaxerxes, son of Ahasuerus, the opponents claimed that the Israelites were preparing to revolt against the king once the city had been rebuilt. The king investigated their claims and then ordered the building to be stopped until a further decree had been pronounced by him (v. 21). The opponents went to the Jews and forcibly stopped them (v. 23), indicating that they may have torn down what had already been built. When Nehemiah, Artaxerxes' cupbearer, asked for permission to start the building again, the king obviously was

persuaded to overturn any order he had previously given since the project was completed under Nehemiah's supervision (Neh 6:15).

(Bible Notes- Because of Darius's assistance, the Israelites were able to complete the temple about four years later and 70 years after it had first been destroyed—around 515 B.C.)

Vs. 16-22- Finally, the Jewish people have come full circle from punishment, to exile, to

restoration. What is described here?

Chapter 7: The Return of Exiles led by Ezra

(Bible Notes- This chapter begins in 458 B.C., about 50 or 60 years after the events at the end of chapter 6. During that interval, the events recorded in the book of Esther took place (between 483 and 471 B.C.). Israel was at a spiritually low point when Ezra brought the second group of exiles to Jerusalem at this time. Also, this section changes from third to first person, supporting the idea that Ezra authored this book.)

Vs. 1- Which king of Persia was in power when Ezra led exiles back to Jerusalem?

Vs. 6- How was Ezra described?

(Bible Notes- Ezra was chosen by God to lead His people. He was a *scribe skilled in the law of Moses* (v.6). This training might not seem too remarkable except that Ezra had been born in Babylon. He devoted himself to the study of God's Word, even while living in a foreign land, rather than being assimilated into he foreign culture. The Bible notes that the *gracious hand of His God was on him* (v. 9; see also 7:28; 8:18, 22, 31; Neh 2:8, 18) *because Ezra had determined in his heart to study the law of the Lord, to obey it, and to teach its statutes and ordinances in Israel* (7:10).

We, too, can commit to this same heart for the Lord!

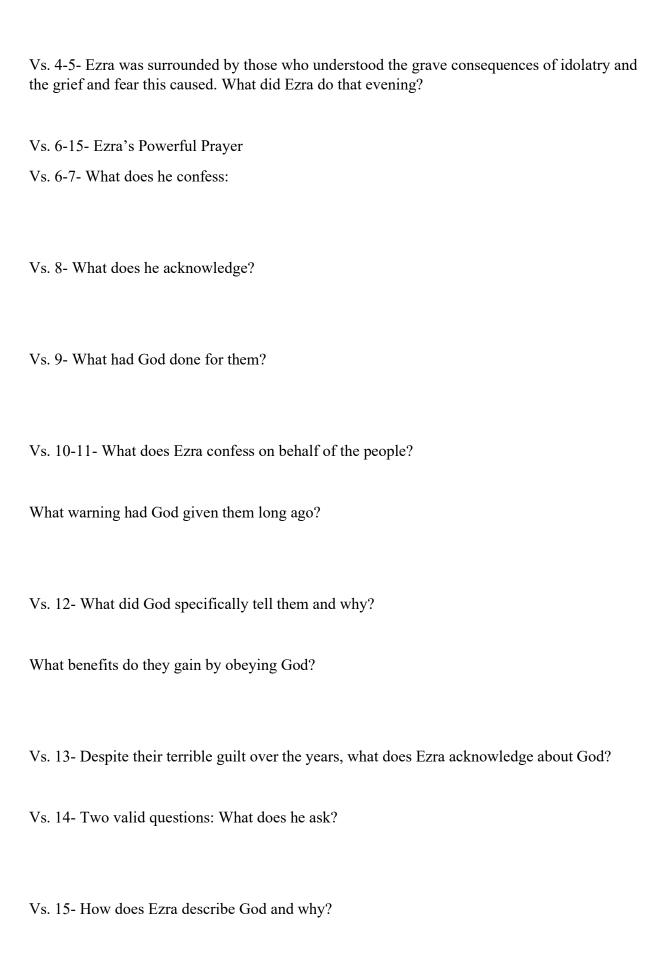

Vs. 3- How did Ezra react to this news?

(Bible Notes- The leaders who had come with Ezra discovered unfaithfulness among the Israelites in Jerusalem. The leaders who were already there were leading the people into sin. The people were adopting the detestable practices of the pagans who surrounded them and were even intermarrying with them (cp. Dt 7:1-4). The first exiles knew how seriously God took sin since they had been taken into exile because of their unfaithfulness. Now, just 80 years after God had brought them back to Israel, the priests, Levites, and other leaders were moving in the same direction. These tragic verses illustrate how quickly sin can take hold in people. True followers of God will always be grieved by sin.)



Ezra shows a beautiful example of reverence and humility.

Chapter 10: Sending Away Foreign Wives

Vs. 1-2- As a crowd gathered around Ezra as he wept and prayed, how did Shecaniah respond on behalf of the people?

Vs. 3-4- What was his solution to the problem?

(Bible Notes- The sin of marrying foreign women (v. 10; Lv 26:40) precipitated the division of the kingdom after the reign of King Solomon, whose love of "many foreign women" also marked the spiritual decline of Judah under the following Davidic kings of Judah (1 Kg 11:1-13). Intermarrying with the surrounding peoples not only threatened to adulterate the Israelite remnant's identity as the people with whose God was Yahweh but also would have led to the replacement of this distinct people with an indistinct and syncretistic people (Gn 12:1-3; Dt 7:6-7; Ps 106:34-47). Israel's separation from the pagan nations was intended to testify to their purity as God's holy nation.)

Vs. 5-11- Ezra sends a proclamation to notify all men of Judah and Jerusalem to assemble at the house of God on the 20th day of the 9th month. What were they all chared to do?

Vs. 12-16- Sorting this out would take time. Why?

Vs. 18-22- Who was among the first group to be listed?

Vs. 23-43- These effected people of every walk of life. What groups are listed here?

Vs. 44- Why were all these singled out?

(Bible Notes- In the concluding verses of this chapter, Ezra listed all those who had taken pagan wives; the number was more than 100. The mood was hopeful; yet only 13 years later Nehemiah would be faced with the same problem of mixed marriages (Neh 13:23-31).

Nehemiah

The first-person wording throughout the book suggests the scribe Nehemiah was the author. He wrote it between 430 and 424 B.C. to the Israelites who had returned from exile to Jerusalem. The book of Nehemiah is part of the Writings (*Kethuvim*) in the Hebrew Bible where it was originally grouped with Ezra as one book. Some sources identified Ezra and Nehemiah as 1 Ezra and 2 Ezra. The books of Ezra and Nehemiah should be read together, as each provides an important historical and theological account of postexilic Israel. -Bible Notes.

Chapter 1:

Vs. 1-3- Men from Judah come to Nehemiah who is living in Susa during the 20th year of King Artaxerxes. What did Nehemiah ask them?

(Bible Notes- The book opens around 445 B.C., approximately 13 years after Ezra's return (Ezr 7:7) and the twentieth year in the reign of King Artaxerxes 1, the son of King Ahasuerus (Xerxes 1), who made Esther his queen (Est 1:1-2; 2:15-17). The month of Chislev was between November and December. Although an estimated 50,000 Jews returned to Judea, many remained behind in the Persian Empire. At this point, the number of Israelites had dwindled, and they had become scattered among the nations.)

Vs. 4- How did Nehemiah respond to their news?

Vs. 5-11 – Nehemiah's heart-felt prayer:

Chapter 2:

(Bible Notes- Nehemiah prayed for four months before he approached the king to seek his help.)

Vs 2 – What does the king notice about Nehemiah?

How was Nehemiah feeling?

(Bible Notes- Nehemiah violated the rules of the Susa court by appearing sad in the king's presence. Had his sadness been interpreted as displeasure with the, Nehemiah could have been put to death immediately.)

Vs. 3-4- Nehemiah explains why he is sad. How did the king respond?

What does Nehemiah do before he answers the king?

We should always follow this example and pray before we have tough conversations.

Vs 5 – What does he request of the king?

Vs. 6- What specifics did the king want to know?

Nehemiah knew the king expected him to return, yet his faithfulness to God was all that mattered to him. That's an amazing faith!

Vs. 7-8- What additional requests did he make to the king?

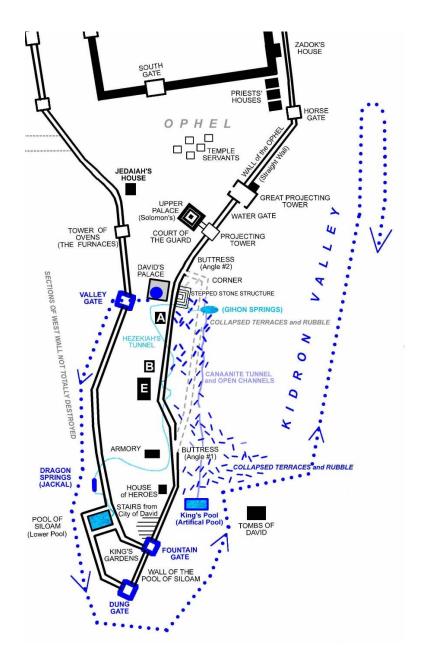
Why did the king grant these requests?

Vs. 9- Not only did the king write the letters, but what else did he provide?

Vs. 10- Who are mentioned here and why were they displeased?

(Bible Notes- Under subsequent Babylonian rule, Jerusalem and parts of Judah were assigned to Samaria's governance. Sanballat, a Horonite of mixed ancestry, governed parts of Judah from Samaria (i.e., the land belonging to the northern kingdom of Israel until the Assyrian conquest). Tobiah was the governor of the Persian-controlled Transjordan. Both Sanballat and Tobiah followed syncretistic religions of the area and no doubt saw Nehemiah's arrival as a threat to their authority over the region.)

Vs. 11-15- Three days after arrival, he goes out at night to inspect the damage. See image below to follow his path as he surveyed the damage. (Image from Jesuswalk.com)



Vs. 16- Who would be doing this work to rebuild?

Vs. 17-18- He finally tells everyone his plan. How does he convince them?

What was the response of the people?

Vs. 19- How did their enemies respond?

(Bible Notes- Regardless of Nehemiah's preparation, unexpected problems were bound to occur, but the way Nehemiah handled those problems displayed his faith in God. Throughout the story, those who opposed Nehemiah ridiculed him, plotted to kill him, and challenged his character. He was mocked, accused of sedition, and his motives for rebuilding the wall were questioned. Yet, Nehemiah refused to participate in the slander or to become sidetracked by fear and hesitation. He responded by declaring that God would give them success in their endeavor to build the wall.)

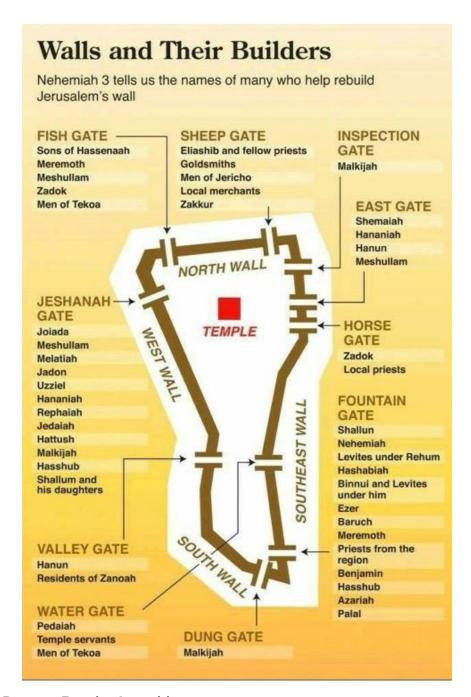
Chapter 3: Efforts to Rebuild the Wall

(Bible Notes- Nehemiah was able to motivate a diverse group by assigning them to sections close to their homes if they lived in or near Jerusalem or by giving them responsibility over specific sections. This decision demonstrates careful planning and great organization ability.)

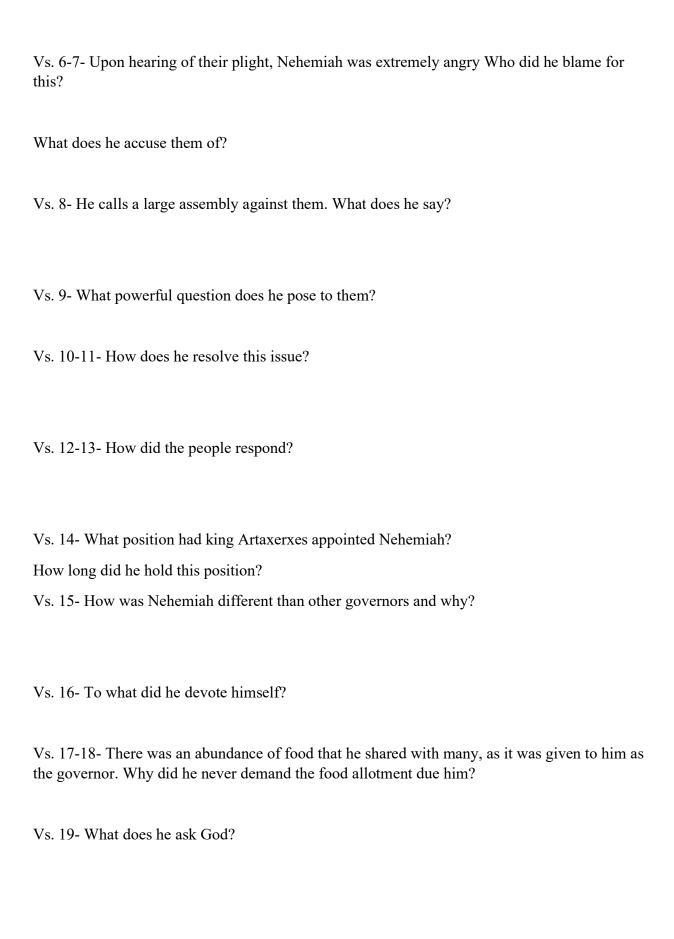


Chapter 4: Progress Despite Opposition

Vs. 1-3 – We saw these enemies of the Israelites mentioned in chapter two. Initially they just hurled insults. What things did they say?

Vs. 4-5- The Jews turned their requests to God instead of retaliating. What was their prayer?

Vs. 6-7- The Jews were motivated and got the wall built to half its height. Now their enemies are furious. Who is added to the list of enemies?
Vs. 8- What was their plan?
Vs. 9- Upon hearing of this plot against them, what did Nehemiah and the Jews do?
Vs. 10- This verse helps illustrate the massive undertaking Nehemiah and the people faced. How had many in Judah felt about rebuilding?
Vs. 11-14- Their enemies tried to sneak up on them with intent to kill. What does Nehemiah do and say to protect and encourage the people?
Vs. 15- Who does Nehemiah say frustrated the plans of their enemies?
Vs. 16-18- They boldly continued the work. What precautions did they take?

Vs. 4-7- After multiple attempts, Sanballat writes and reveals his concerns. What does he accuse Nehemiah of?

Vs. 13- Who was behind this plot and what did they hope to achieve?

(Bible Notes- Tobiah, who had worked his way into the Jewish nation through intermarriage, had powerful influence within the Jewish community and continued to threaten and try to intimidate Nehemiah (v. 19).

Chapter 7: The Restoration of the People

(Bible Notes- Nehemiah's command to open the gates of Jerusalem only during the busiest hours of the day helped to minimize the threat to the city. Their adversaries would be less likely to invade when the city was full of people. In order to begin bringing residents into the city, Nehemiah initiated a census to determine which families could verify their lineage as full-blooded Jews. Nehemiah made use of the census list that Ezra utilized on the return of the first exiles with Sheshbazzar, Zerubbabel, and Jeshua around 537 B.C. (see Ezr 2). The list reproduced in Nehemiah 7 has only minor differences with Ezra's list.)

Chapter 8:

Vs. 1-2- On the seventh month, after the Israelites had gotten settled into their cities, what did they do?

(Bible Notes- The first day of the seventh month was the traditional day that the Israelites celebrated the Feast of Trumpets (v.2; cp. Lv 23:24). The modern-day celebration of *Rosh Hashanah* is traced back to this celebration.)

Vs. 3-6- Describe this scene:

Vs. 7-9- The Levites explained the law of God. Why did they need to translate?

What did these leaders tell them about their weeping?

Vs. 10- What did he encourage them to do?

(Bible Notes- Since some of the Jews grew up in Babylon, they did not know Hebrew and may have been hearing it for the first time (see 13:24). The leaders not only translated the Scripture but also expounded on it. Their reaction was to mourn and weep, yet Nehemiah and the other leaders instructed the people not to mourn or weep because the Feast of Trumpets was a time of celebration. They were to receive strength from rejoicing in the Lord.)

Vs. 11-12- The Levites quieted the people and encouraged them to celebrate. Why were they so moved?

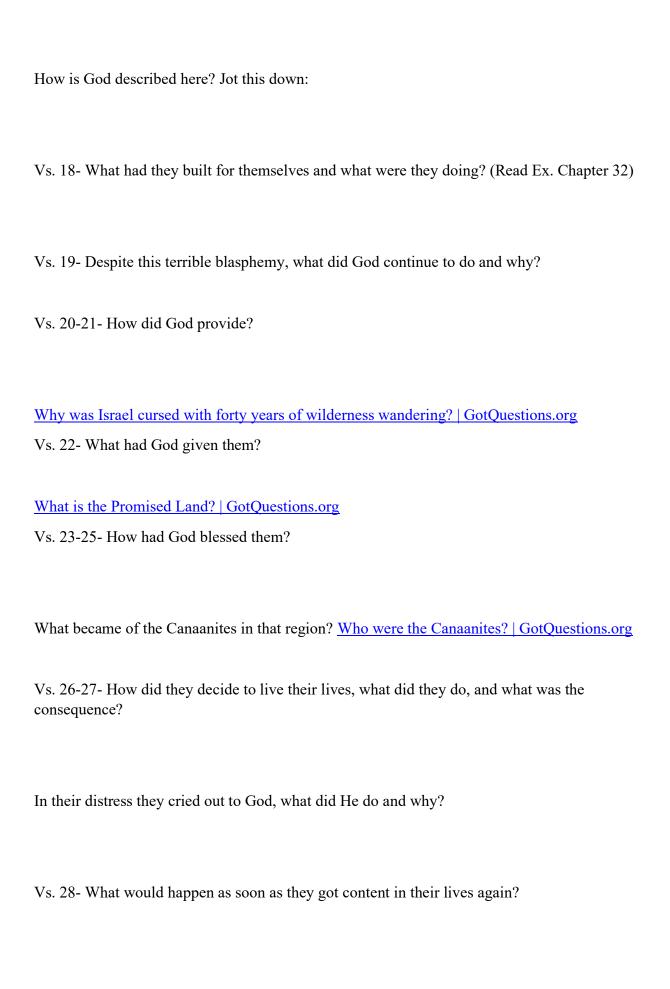

Chapter 10: The Sealing of the Covenant
Vs. 1-28- Nehemiah leads the people in signing this agreement and commitment to the Lord. Who are the groups mentioned?

Vs. 30-39- These verses outline their specific commitments. Explain:

Vs. 30-

(Bible Notes- Intermarriage (cp. 13:23-28; see also Ex 34:15-16; Dt 7:1-4). Interfaith marriages often led to the worship of other gods and thus to a compromise of God's standards for His people (cp. Solomon, 1 Kg 11:1-10; Neh 13:26). Marriage is an institution designed to be a witness for God, and the Israelites had a long history of ignoring this standard.)

Vs. 31-

(Bible Notes- The Sabbath (Neh 10:31; see also Ex 20:10; Lv 23:3; Dt 5:14) and the sabbatical year regulations (Neh 10:31; see also Ex 23:10-11; Lv 25:4-5; Dt 15:1-2). Not to work one day out of seven demonstrated their trust that God would provide for their needs, an immense test of faith for an agricultural people.)

Chapter 11: The Repopulation of Jerusalem

Vs. 1- How did they determine who would stay in Jerusalem with the leaders?

(Bible Notes- The people realized that Jerusalem needed to be repopulated, yet with the city still needing extensive repair and vulnerable to attack, living inside the city would not have been a very attractive assignment.)

(Bible Notes- Nehemiah required representatives from each of the leading religious families from Judah, Benjamin's descendants, as well as the priests (vv. 10-14) and the Levities (vv. 15-18). These were the same tribes who had populated the city during David's time.)

Chapter 12:

Vs. 1-26- (Bible Notes- The priests and the Levites were among the most important among the people who returned from the exile because they reestablished worship among the people. Of note is Joiada's son Jonathan, who married Sanballat's daughter, making the grandson of the high priest Eliashib the son-in-law of Sanballat (vv. 10-11,22; see 13:28). This marriage took place before the commitment was made in chapter 11 and may explain why Sanballat was able to gain access to the people and spread rumors during the construction of the wall.)

Vs. 27-47- The Dedication of the Walls

(Bible Notes- Nehemiah also reestablished the temple service in the manner organized by David and Solomon for the first temple. This represents the crescendo in the restoration of Israel; the temple and wall had been secured, God's Word stood once again as Israel's authority, and the temple worship was reinstituted. The people demonstrated their commitment to their vow by bringing their tithers (tenths) to the storehouses for the Levites (10:35-39).

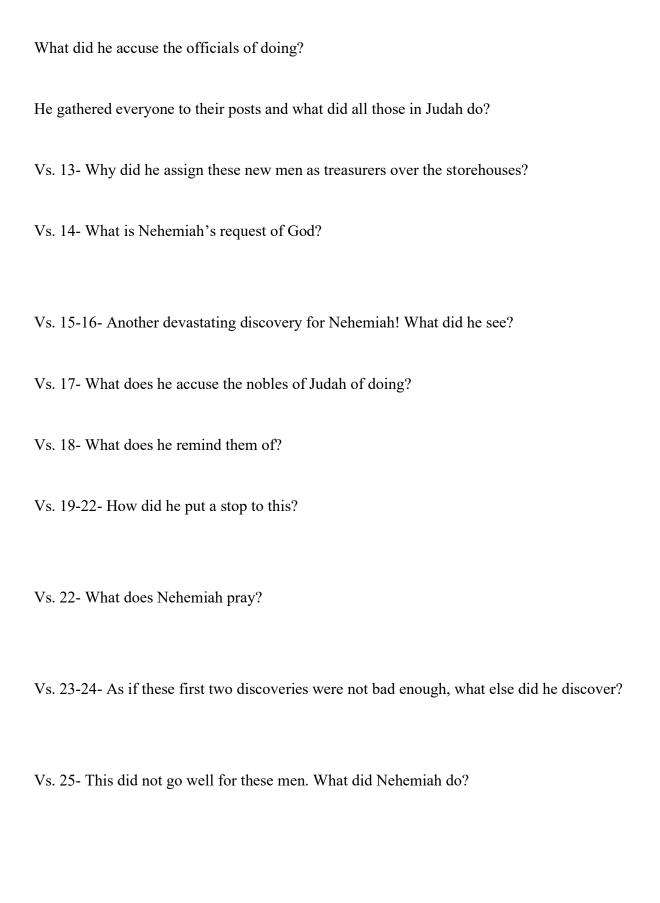
