



(**Bible Notes-** The parallel between the Son and the Father is continually asserted by John. Never is the Son purported to be in charge of the Father, but He is sent by the Father, obedient to the Father, committed to glorifying the Father (5:23,27,30; 6:44; 8:28-29). The Son was given power by the Father to render judgment (5:27). Jesus describes His relationship with the Father as being one in which He is ontologically (of the same essence or being) equal with the Father yet *functionally* subordinate to Him.)

These verses are among the few eschatological references in John. The idea is that human works simply bear testimony to decisions in the hearts of individuals-whether to follow righteousness or wickedness).



Recognize here: Jesus continually emphasizes that He is life. This is critical to remember when looking at salvation. He is claiming that He is the One who gives eternal life.


(Bible Notes- Festival of Tabernacles- celebrated on the 15th day of the seventh month and beginning five days after the Day of Atonement (Yom Kippur) for seven days. Each family would gather in Jerusalem and build temporary shelters in which they would live the entire festival. These shelters were symbolic of the years spent wandering the desert after leaving slavery in Egypt. These dwellings represent shelter and protection. The festival was a time of thanksgiving for the harvest that marked their transition from nomadic living to more permanent housing in their own land.)

(Bible Notes- Rituals accompanying the feasts often included the pouring out of water to picture God's provision of water to the people during their wandering in the wilderness (Ex 17:6) and in times of drought in the land (1Kg 18:45). This provision of water was temporary relief to their thirst. Therefore, considering their life in an arid, desert terrain, the people would understand the metaphor of Jesus' offer of their-quenching water as ultimate sustenance and satisfaction.)



Jesus distinguished between physical death and spiritual death and simply affirmed that one who believed in Him would not suffer spiritual death but would in fact inherit life everlasting (v 52; see also Rev 2:11; 20:6)



It's been written and argued over the years that Jesus could only be one of the following based on His teaching- Liar, Lunatic, or Lord. There is no way to marry all He said and the life He lived by simply calling Him a "good" example, etc. Something to ponder. Either He was who He said He was, or He wasn't. He cannot just be a "good teacher" or "good prophet".)

An emotional scene: Why do you think Jesus felt these emotions if He knew the outcome? Is this reassuring to see that Jesus is ok with us bringing our frustrations and questions and anger to Him? (Bible Notes- Upon seeing Jesus' entry into Jerusalem, the Pharisees exclaimed that *the world has gone after Him!* (v. 19), a unique note from John, which prepares the way for his mention of the Greeks who came to Jesus. These "Greeks" may have been God-fearing men like Cornelius (Ac 10) or proselytes. The designation is one generally inclusive of Gentiles. The raising of Lazarus from the dead had far-reaching effects. Certainly these words offered a prophetic voice of what would come through Jesus' atonement for the sins of the world—Jews and Gentiles (Jn 12:32).

Vs. 27-28- Here begins the depiction of Jesus' turmoil of knowing what is to come. Despite the pain of what will come, who will be glorified?

Can we learn to believe like this and trust God in ALL circumstances?

Vs. 28-29- Then came a voice from heaven: what does it say?

What did the people think they heard?

Obviously, this was an audible sound. What a powerful moment!

Vs. 30- For whose benefit was the voice from heaven?

Vs. 31- Who is "the ruler of this world" and what will happen to him?



Vs. 6-19- Jesus prays for His disciples: What sets the disciples apart?

Chapter 18:

John does not give the details of Jesus' prayer and anguish in the garden but jumps right to Judas' betrayal and the mob's arrival at the garden.

Vs. 4- This verse prefaces the entire narrative with a very important fact. What is it?

Vs. 8-9- Jesus willingly addresses the mob, but who was He seeking to remove from this mob?

Vs. 10- Peter reacts immediately and impulsively. What does he do?

Explain Jesus' reaction:

Vs. 12-14- Jesus is taken by the mob. John's account mention Annas. Who was he?

(Bible Notes- Since Jewish law claimed that the role of high priest was held for life, Annas still exercised authority and influence.)

Vs. 15-17- Peter and another disciple who was an acquaintance of the high priest, follow Jesus.


John also records Peter's denials of Jesus before the rooster crows. As this is happening Jesus is being questioned. This account does mention some comments and questions from Jesus. What does He say?

(Bible Notes: The identity of another disciple (18:15) is not stated in Scripture. Some have speculated that it may have been Joseph of Arimathea or Nicodemus, who helped bury Jesus. However, the person most often identified in this way in the book of John seems to be John himself. In any case, this individual had the distinction of being known by the high priest.)

Vs. 24-27- They transfer Jesus from Annas to Caiaphas. Peter, again, is noticed by servants within the courtyard. Unfortunately, what does he do?

Vs. 28- Caiphas then sends Him to the governor's headquarters. Who was the governor?

(Bible Notes: Although the Sanhedrin, the Jewish Supreme Court, had the authority to assess the death penalty, they could not carry out executions without the approval of the Roman government.)



After several arguments and attempts to release Jesus, Pilate finally turns Him over to be crucified at the urging of the Jews.

Vs. 17-30- The cross: The sign Pilate placed above Jesus' cross was written in what 3 languages?

(Bible Notes: Writing in these three languages only enhanced the importance of Jesus' death having universal influence. Hebrew was the language spoken by the Jews. Latin was the language of Rome, and Greek was the language of the marketplace and eastern provinces of the empire.)

Vs. 23-24- This fulfills the prophecy in Psalm 22:18. What is this regarding?

Vs. 25-27- John writes of Jesus' concern for who? _____ What is beautiful about this brief exchange?

Who did He say was her son now and would have care for her?

What were Jesus' final words?

(Bible Notes: It is finished is from the Greek word *tetelestai*, "accomplished, completed, fulfilled". The verb is the perfect tense, signifying something accomplished in the past with continuing results in the present and future.)

What did Jesus say on the cross? | 7 Powerful Statements (soh.church)

Vs. 31-37- Why did they need to hasten the deaths of these men and how did they traditionally do this?

John specifically says the scriptures were fulfilled so people will know He was telling the truth and so others would believe.

See: Exodus 12:46, Numbers 9:12, Psalm 34:20 - What do these discuss?

See: Zechariah 12:10- What does this say?

Why is it so important to understand the significance of these prophecies being fulfilled?

Vs. 38-42- These verses also verify who helped bury Jesus. Who were they and what did they do?

(Bible Notes: Joseph of Arimathea is mentioned in all the Gospels (v. 38; Mt 27: 57-60; Mk 15: 42-46; Lk 23:50-56). He was wealthy, a member of the Sanhedrin, a God-fearing man, and in the end a follower of Christ. His daring request became a public confession of his faith in Christ (Jn 19:38). Joseph and Nicodemus (v. 39), as members of the Jewish "supreme court", had much more to lose than most of the other followers of Jesus. With the Jews' hostility toward Jesus, even their lives, not to mention livelihoods and reputations, were on the line.)

Chapter 20:

Vs. 1-2- Early this Sunday morning,	while it was still dark, who does John say saw the stone
rolled away?	What did she immediately do and think?

(Bible Notes: John devotes more space to the resurrection account than any of the other Gospel writers. In this chapter, Peter and John ("the one Jesus loved") are juxtaposed. Both of them ran to the tomb and found it empty, but only the beloved disciple *saw, and believed* (v3-10). The rest of the chapter spotlights the interaction between Mary and Jesus (v11-18) and between the disciples and Jesus (v19-29). The visit from the women occurred early on Sunday morning. John mentioned only Mary Magdalene, but others are noted in the Synoptic Gospels (v.1; Mt 28:1; Mk 16:1; Lk 24:10). *The other disciple* (Jn 20:3) seems to be the Apostle John, who spoke of himself humbly in this way.)

Vs. 3-10- "The other disciple, the one Jesus loved"; to whom is this referring?

These two men run back to the tomb with Mary and what do they notice?

What does verse 8 tell us about John?

Vs. 9- What did they not yet understand?

Vs. 11-18- Mary could not bring herself to leave and she stayed there facing the tomb and crying. What did she see when she looked inside the tomb again?

Then she turns as another asks her, "Why are you crying?" Who was it?

15-16- She doesn't immediately recognize Him. When does she finally know it is Jesus?

Vs. 17- Jesus says, "Do not cling to Me for I have not yet ascended to My Father". (Bible Notes-He was not concerned about being touched since He asked Thomas to touch Him, (vs.27). Rather, He wanted Mary to realize that He was there only temporarily.)

Vs. 18- Who does she immediately go tell?

Vs. 19-22- Why were they sitting behind locked doors?

Jesus suddenly appears to them and what does He show them?

How did He bestow the Holy Spirit onto them?

(Bible Notes: Old Testament Imagery (Gn. 2:7, Ezk 37:9). Christ imparted spiritual life in the same way God gave physical life to Adam). Again, showing His deity.

Vs. 24-25- Doubting Thomas: Despite every one of his closest friends relaying the story of this encounter with the risen Christ, what does Thomas say since he was not a witness to these events?

Do you know people like this, and can you understand this perspective?

Notice, 8 days later, Jesus appears again and confronts Thomas personally. Now what is Thomas' reaction?

Jesus shows patience and understanding for doubters. Why?

Who does Jesus say are blessed?

Vs. 30-31- John writes his objective here. What is his ultimate purpose?

Chapter 21:

Vs. 1-6- As the disciples were fishing, they experience Jesus' powerful intervention. What does Jesus ask them to do in order to catch fish and what ends up happening?

(Bible Notes- Important highlights of this section include the similarity of the miracle of the catch of fish and the account of the initial call of the disciples recorded in Lk 5:1-11.)

Vs. 14- How many times had the Lord appeared to them at this point?

Vs. 15-19- What does Jesus ask Peter, and what does He want him to do?

Why did Jesus tell Peter to "feed my sheep" in John 21? | GotQuestions.org

What does He mean by this?

Vs. 18-19- What does Jesus tell Peter that was tough to hear?

(Bible Notes- Jesus also prophesied that Peter would die as a martyr because of his commitment to follow Christ. Many interpret *stretch out your hands* as a reference to crucifixion. According to tradition, Peter was crucified in Rome between A.D. 64 and 68, and he insisted on being crucified upside down because he did not feel worthy to die as his Savior did.)

Vs. 20-21- What is Peter's initial reaction to this news?

Do you see this as such a typical and realistic response we would have as humans? Why or why not?

Vs. 22-23- What did Jesus answer and what word spread about John?

John clarifies that rumor here. What does he clear up?

Vs. 24- John confirms that he is the one referred to in the writings and his testimony is ...

Vs. 25- (Jot this one down). Great finisher!
