In looking at Matthew's account and Luke's account, it is known that Pharisees and Sadducees, tax collectors, soldiers, and more were present to inquire of John and some wanted to be baptized. He calls the Pharisees and Sadducees a "brood of vipers" fleeing from the coming wrath. What does he tell them to do? What does that mean?

What does John mean when he tells the crowd, "Don't start saying to yourselves, 'We have Abraham as our father,' for I tell you that God is able to raise up children for Abraham from these stones!"

(Bible Notes: Luke seems primarily concerned with presenting Jesus as Savior of all people, not just the Jews. With the exception of verses 23-27, you can find the genealogy in the Old Testament. (Gn 5: 3-32; 11:10-26; Ruth 4:18:22; 1Ch 1:1-4; 24-28; 2:1-15)

Some scholars have suggested that Luke presents Christ's natural and royal ancestry though Mary while Matthew presents Christ's legal and royal ancestry through Jospeh. Yet Luke still substantiates His messianic claim by noting Jesus' descent from David.

Some have commented extensively on the differences between the genealogies in Mt 1:1-17 and here in Luke 3:23-28. In summary, consider these options for explaining the differences:

- One gives legal descent and the other physical descent, which occurred especially when the law of Levirate marriage was involved (Dt. 25:5)
- Both Mary and Joseph descended from David but by different branches of the family.



In all three Synoptic Gospels, Levi's dinner and guests led to questions about religious practices. The outcome was that Jesus' mission involved a radical break with traditional religious practices. He did not come merely to add to what was already practiced. His ministry involved something that was radically new. This profound difference was seen in the company He kept.)

Vs.17-26- Jesus' sermon: (Bible Notes: Although the setting for this sermon and the Sermon on the Mount in Matthew 5-7 is considered the same by many, others believe the difference in content suggests two different settings of the sermon. Of course, there are very logical choices:

- The same location and sermon but described by two men from their different perspectives.
- The same location but two different, yet similar, messages were delivered to different audiences.
- Two similar sermons were delivered by Jesus in different locations with the heart of the message, namely, the nature of the Christian life, being the same but with varying content-a situation common among modern-day itinerant preachers who each tends to have a keynote message.)

Vs. 1-6- Who does Jesus equip to cast out demons, heal the sick, and proclaim the Kingdom of God?

Vs. 7-9- Who did some presume Jesus to be?

Why would this concern Herod?

Vs. 10-20- Feeding of the 5,000: (This story is in all four gospels). Who does Jesus tell to feed the people?

What food was available?

Jesus blesses the loaves and fish, and everyone ate and was filled. How many baskets of leftovers were there?

Who does Peter acknowledge Christ to be?

What can we learn from this very important story mentioned in every gospel?

Vs. 22- Jesus drops the bombshell news to His disciples. This is a lot for them to take in! What does He tell them?

Vs. 23-26- Summarize what Jesus says in these verses:

Vs. 25- Jesus also poses this important question here. What does He mean by this?

Vs. 28-36- The Transfiguration:

(Bible Notes: This mountain is the one on which Moses spoke to God- Mt. Sinai/Mt. Horeb (Ex. 19:1-6; 20:24; 24: 12-18; 31:18, Dt. 5:2) and Elijah (1 Kg 19: 8-18). Jesus was fulfilling the law and the words of the prophets. Also, the cloud: God made known His presence on Mt. Sinai (Ex. 24:16), in His tabernacle (Ex. 40:34; Nm 9:17), and later in the temple (1 Kg 8:10-11) by descending upon and fulfilling each with a cloud. After the resurrection, Jesus ascended to heaven in the clouds and promised to return in the same manner. (Acts 1:9-11).

This was an amazing experience and what disciples witnessed this?

These disciples were obedient to Jesus and did not tell anyone of this event until after His resurrection.

(Bible Notes: The healing of the demon-possessed boy further demonstrated the power and *greatness of God* (vs. 43). Although the physical effects were similar to those caused by epilepsy, the boy's father and Jesus focused on the demonic source of the boy's suffering).

Vs. 40-41- Why do you think Jesus responded like this upon hearing from the boy's father?

Vs. 43-44- Jesus makes a critical point and statement He insists His disciples absorb and fully understand. What does He tell them?

Vs. 43- After Jesus heals the boy it says, "they were all astonished at the greatness of _____".



(Bible Notes: The reference to baptism (vs 50) as in Mark 10:38 seems to be used as a reference to His coming death, at which time He would be immersed in His suffering on the cross.)

Vs. 51-53- Jesus quotes Mc 7:6 referring to the division that will ensue because of Him. He knows the hearts of all people. What obvious truth is He stating here and is this still true today?

Vs. 54-56- Why is Jesus so frustrated with some people?

Feels like He could be speaking to our world today as well. Thoughts?

Chapter 13:

Vs. 1-5- What does Jesus repeatedly say here?

Is repentance a change of mind or a turning from sin? | GotQuestions.org

Vs. 6-9 – Parable of the fig tree: What does this mean?

(Bible Notes: Jesus used the familiar fig tree to represent Israel. Despite its lack of fruit, the tree received an additional year of grace. However, Israel remained in danger of God's judgment if the nation continued to reject her Messiah.)

Vs. 10-17- Another run in with the synagogue leaders. What did Jesus do that provoked the leader?

In this exchange, what point does Jesus make?

Are you wondering how they could not see the miracles before their eyes because they were so concerned about rules? Thoughts?

Vs. 18-21- What does Jesus compare the Kingdom of God to and what is His meaning behind these comparisons?

God. Abraham's response pointed to an attitude of unbelief. Rejecting the Scriptures would not be changed even by one who had risen from the grave (v31), as would be even more evident when Jesus Himself arose from the dead.)



(Bible Notes: Only Luke mentions that this betrayal was ultimately the work of Satan. Luke was careful to show that Jesus' mission meant the ultimate demise of the Devil. Throughout his narrative, Luke has referred to Satan's activity and to his ultimate downfall (10:18-20). But in this context Satan was still at work, causing dissension and seeking to interfere with Jesus' mission (22:23). Satan entered Judas in order to move him to betray Jesus (v. 3). Judas then became the instrument of Satan to accomplish his purpose of trying to destroy Jesus' life and ministry).

What motivated Judas to do this?

Vs. 63-71- Within the high priest's house, those holding Jesus began to terrorize Him. What were they doing?

What was the big question He was asked the next morning before the Sanhedrin?

Vs. 67-69- What point does Jesus make?

Chapter 23:

Vs. 1-5- Jesus before Pilate: What did they tell Pilate He was accused of?

How does Jesus answer when Pilate asks Him if He is King of the Jews?

Vs. 6-12- Pilate realizes this isn't his issue to deal with so who does he send Jesus to?

How did the visit with Herod go?

(Bible Notes: There were a few unique contributions Luke made to the crucifixion narrative. First, he mentions that when Pilate (Pontius Pilate, Roman governor, A.D. 26-36) found out that Jesus was a Galilean, he sent Him to Herod, who was in Jerusalem at the time (v 6-12). Herod

interrogated Jesus, mocked Him, and then sent Him back to Pilate. That day, Luke noted that Herod and Pilate had become friends (v12).

Vs. 13-25- What does Pilate explain to His accusers after Herod sends Jesus back?

What punishment does he suggest?

Vs. 17- What was common during the festival?

Who does the crowd want released?

How many times did Luke say Pilate tried to convince the crowd of Jesus' innocence?

Vs. 26-31- After His whipping, He was led away to carry His cross. Who is pulled to help Him?

Luke mentions a conversation Jesus has as He passes by and sees His women followers "mourning and lamenting" Him. What does He say?

(Bible Notes: Second, Luke records Jesus' words to the Daughter of Jerusalem, a tender and affectionate designation (vv. 28-31). Jesus told them not to weep for Him but for their great city, which would be destroyed. Barren women who had no children would be fortunate in the sense that they would not have to see their children suffer and die in the awful destruction coming (v. 29). An indication of this was seen in what they were doing to Him. Luke's concern for the future of Jerusalem was clearly evident here.)

Vs. 34- Jesus is hung between two criminals. What does Jesus say?

What did they do with His clothes? (Prophesied in Psalm 22:18)

Vs. 35-37- Onlookers were scoffing and mocking. What comments were they making?

Vs. 39-43- What does the criminal on the cross next to Jesus ask of Him?

What was Jesus' reply?

(Bible Notes: Third, Luke alone mentions that one of the criminals crucified with Christ repented and actually acknowledged Jesus as God. He knew that Jesus was innocent, and he also had heard about the kingdom Jesus was about to enter (vv. 41-43).
